



#### **Crafthole and District Open Flower Show 2018 Report**

The Garden Judging was held on Wednesday 1st August. Paul Stone from Portwrinkle was our new judge and he was accompanied around by David and Rosalie Dunn. The day of the judging was fine but wind and rain earlier in the week damaged many of the entries which were still bravely included. The number of entries was up this year and Chris Kennedy, who announced the cup and prize winners, encouraged others to enter next year because colourful gardens enhanced the ambience of the parish for visitors and increased the pride for residents, and because it was not that difficult to be a winner.

The day of the Show itself on Saturday 11<sup>th</sup> August was very damp and humid and a lot of new faces came along to view the exhibits. Despite the vagaries of the weather in 2018, entries were up by over 70 on last year. The paintings presented were of a particularly high standard and the children of all ages had enjoyed submitting a remarkable array of novel models using

craft lollipop sticks. Cookery was of its usual high standard and the inclusion of Mary Berry's Cornish Sticky Cake was a popular class. The show was opened by John Cameron who has been a regular exhibitor for many years. He thanked the present Committee and remembered previous Committee members and noted that many of the cups reflected these earlier members' names. He wondered if he would present himself with any of the cups and indeed he did! He was given gifts by Chris and Gill Kennedy's younger grandchildren: Beth, Jago and Maddy Furneaux.

Warren Evans deservedly won the cup for the most points in the 2018 Show with points in the vegetable, fruit, painting and cut flowers sections of the Show.



#### **New Footpath**

#### **Chris Kennedy**

It is now possible to walk to Polscoe from Crafthole without having to walk on the busy B3247. The Antony Estate have granted the Parish Council a 40-year lease to use the path and Kevin Andrew has generously given up part of his field to allow the path. The path was financed jointly by a grant from the Rural Development Programme, DEFRA, and a contribution of £310 from the Sheviock Parish Council. The path extends the Polscoe hill section of the Crafthole Circular Path. It starts from opposite the Circular

Walk at Trewrickle Lane and proceeds downhill exiting onto the Old Road to Polbathic. This path provides safe access to Tredossel, Tregenna and Tredis along quiet lanes. It also links at Tregenna to the footpath back to Trewrickle Lane and the remainder of the circular path and Sanders Lane which crosses the Downderry Road and gives access to Portwrinkle and the coastal path. I hope walkers will enjoy this latest addition to the footpaths in the parish. Great thank you to the Estate, Kevin Andrew, DEFRA and the Parish Council.

There has been a number of complaints regarding the flying of drones in what are considered to be an intrusive manner.

Please note there are guidelines in the use of drones which prohibit flying within 150 ft. of any property, and 500 ft. of crowds and built up areas.

If you think you see a drone contravening these limits, report it to the police.

**South West Ambulance** crews are asking people to think about where they park.

They stated that "several times this summer" the service had struggled to reach patients due to parked vehicles causing problems.

The fire brigade suffer similar problems, maybe more so with their larger vehicles. Indeed, Fire appliances were hindered in their efforts to access the Finnygook on the day of the fire.

For emergency service vehicles to get pass safely, it is recommended that at least 10ft of space should be allowed.

The service said: "If there's not that much space, don't park there."

If all else fails, refer to the Highway Code 243 which, among other restrictions states

"Do not stop or park anywhere you would prevent access for Emergency Services";

"Opposite or within 10 metres (32 feet) of a junction, except in an authorised parking space"; and

"Where the kerb has been lowered to help wheelchair users and powered mobility vehicles"

Some of you thought the plants looked "dodgy", but as

my packet of Lidl tomato seeds all germinated I planted them out. I haven't watered them at all and now I'm reaping my harvest.

The swallows arrived earlier than the house martins this year. Whilst my martins were still repairing their nests my friend's swallows had raised a brood and lost them to the jackdaws. Thankfully they tried again with success. It was a wonderful privilege to watch the whole family sitting on the telegraph wires preparing for their journey.

Sailing and kayaking on the river at Cargreen with my grandchildren we saw salmon leaping and then a grey head popped up. The water was quite shallow and the seal stayed around for quite a while. Local reports say that he is a regular. Perhaps that is why I read a sign on Looe Fish Quay that there is to be a total ban on salmon fishing on the Tamar next year. The seal has depleted the stocks!

My banana plant has regrown. The Magnolia grandiflora is flowering. The grass grows slowly with so little rain. I have 13 bunches of grapes on my outdoor Black Hamburg vine. The blackberries are abundant and the squirrel is already harvesting his hazel nuts. The horse flies have been a nuisance and there are lots of wasps about. Many of us have been swimming regularly in our wonderful sea water and to feel the warmth of the sun from first light has been a bonus

#### **Local Public Transport Update**

LOCAL BUS SERVICE - There will be a few changes to our local bus service commencing on the 24th September - The 21.50 70B ex Royal Parade Bus will terminate at HMS Raleigh and will no longer run through to Crafthole, but it has been agreed for the 20.50 70B ex Royal Parade - Crafthole Bus to be extended to serve Portwrinkle as currently the last bus to the village departs the City at 16.45. We are pleased that CityBus have promised to discuss ways of enabling the 22.50 70A ex Royal Parade Bus to revert to calling at Sheviock and Crafthole and have some ideas of how this may be achieved. This bus of course would enable local residents to again go to the Theatre Royal & the Pavilions.

It is perhaps interesting to note that the late evening bus first ran on the 2<sup>nd</sup> November 1998 as the 22.28 from Royal Parade to Millbrook via Sheviock and Crafthole & to Portwinkle by request. Information about the new service was given in the local public transport article of the 26<sup>th</sup> edition of the Parish Newsletter, exactly 20 years ago in September 1998 following successful negotiations with the then Cornwall County Council who subsidised the service.

In connection with roadworks taking place, New Road between Kingsand & Cawsand will be closed again for several weeks commencing on the 17<sup>th</sup> September and CityBus will be operating a special bus service during this period, which I am told could have a slight effect on buses serving our three villages.

It has been previously mentioned that we have asked for all 6 buses that operate each way on the No. 75 Torpoint – Liskeard Bus Service to revert to run via Sheviock & the Kimberley Foster Bus Stop in Crafthole, instead of the slightly shorter route via the Tregantle Turn. It was mentioned at our last RPPTUG Committee Meeting that CityBus may be able to arrange for at least 2 more of the buses to be scheduled to run each way via Sheviock

If you have any queries, suggestions, or comments etc. about our local bus service that you would like discussed at our Rame Public Transport Users Group Meetings then please contact Dorothee Mathias, myself, or Darryl Hughes. Our next committee meeting will be on the 18<sup>th</sup> October.

LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE FROM ST. GERMANS STATION – It is disappointing but not surprising that the proposed significantly improved changes to our local train service that would see the number of trains calling at St. Germans Station almost doubling in number has been put on hold. The changes will not take place on the 1st January 2019, with most of them not now being introduced until May next year at the earliest. Following the fiasco with the cancellation of thousands of trains on Northern Rail, and Govia Thameslink Services etc; after new timetables were introduced in May, Network Rail has ordered all train operators in the country to abandon any proposed Winter Timetable Changes. There will be some changes to the GWR Timetable in December with a few new services, but other new services will now be introduced more gradually.

We would like to thank the Parish Council for agreeing to replace the Public Transport Notice Board situated near the Community Shop & Post office in Crafthole.

Choices Revd. Iris Bray

Dear Friends,

As I write this young people across the country are receiving their GCSE examination results, prompting a choice of career paths. Last week similar choices were faced by A Level students and their choice of university or vocational course.

This year celebrates the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of certain women over 30 gaining the vote. Full voting rights for all women over 21 didn't come for another ten years. It seems ironic that the year 2018 seems to have been particularly dominated by the exercising of voter choice on both national and international scale. Commentators declare the people have spoken. Although some of the implications of the choices we make may be fairly predictable, other outcomes may only be fully apparent some time later, as the choice to carelessly dispose of the plastics which now pollute the world's oceans is but one example. Many stories in scripture affirm human beings are 'Born Free' and this freedom is defined in the ability to make choices. These choices go beyond the daily choices of life such as what to eat today, although there are far too many in the world for whom such choices exist only in their dreams. The Bible specialises in the choice of priorities and perspectives for life. So the story of Adam and Eve shows humanity as responsible and having a real choice whether to accept God's guidance or not. Ruth positively chose to stay with Naomi when it was assumed widows would return to their own people. Jesus

too freely chose the way of faithfulness to God which would lead to his death as he prayed in Gethsemane "Yet not what I will, but what you will" (Mark 14:36). Before we get carried away with the sense of power that accompanies the exercising of choice, Jesus warned his first disciples against using freedom to throw their weight about and so imprison others. "Not so with you, "Jesus said, and speaking of himself continued "for even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve" (Mark 10:45). This puts a totally different complexion on what it means to exercise choice as free, responsible and most of all loving human beings. Is it loving to make unrealistic demands of others to avoid taking responsibility for our own actions? Probably not. Is it loving to insist everyone else agrees with us so that we don't need to check whether our assumptions are still fit for purpose in the 21st century? Probably not. So although we may sometimes feel we have little choice in the decisions that face us, more often than not nothing could be further from the truth. We have a real choice in the manner of our response. We may add value to every decision by freely choosing that which better reflects the sort of love and service Christians see in Jesus, because the implications of the choices we make may
