

We've seen a sharp increase in reports about fake TV Licensing emails claiming to offer refunds. The emails state that the refund cannot be processed due to "invalid account details". The links provided in the emails lead to phishing websites designed to steal personal and financial details.

Always question unsolicited requests for your personal or financial information in case it's a scam. Never automatically click on a link in an unexpected email or text.



#### St Mary's Church, Endings and Beginnings



Anyone who has travelled to either Torpoint or Trerulefoot cannot have failed to notice the wonderful display of yellow and orange leaves against the black trunks and branches that the trees have put on for us this autumn telling us the year is drawing to an end and we will have a new year to look forward to. The Church year is also drawing to an end as Advent begins and we await the birth of Jesus.

We have had a busy but fulfilling year at St Mary's raising funds towards the restoration of the Church which many of you have been involved with, and hopefully if we receive Heritage Lottery Fund second stage funding work will begin on the Church in the new year. This will mean that the Church and Church Yard will be closed, our last services for approximately six months will take place in St Mary's on Christmas Eve. The Chapel has very kindly offered us the use of the Chapel so that services can continue within the Parish.

We appreciate that many people in the Parish visit and place flowers on family graves, please don't worry there will be notices giving information about 'managed' access.

We have other changes to look forward to – the Parish of Sheviock is part of the Benefice of Antony with Sheviock and Torpoint which has enjoyed a more generous ministerial provision than is available elsewhere. With the vacancy

of the position for Rector of St Germans it has given an opportunity to re-balance ministerial support within the Deanery. The proposal is that Antony and Sheviock become part of a new Benefice with the Parish of St Germans which includes Downderry, Hessenford and Tideford. The churches involved have had an opportunity to express their views. We at St Mary's fully support the proposals appreciating the fact that changes must be made and we are ready to welcome and work with whoever becomes the first incumbent. When draft proposals naming the new benefices and incumbents are issued these will be displayed in the churches affected. A final decision will be made shortly.

We will be sorry to be 'ending' our links with our friends in Torpoint but look forward to 'beginning' new friendships. You are always welcome. God Bless Judy Scott, Church Warden.

#### Whitsand Bay Hotel

This is an application that, I would imagine the applicants would rather not be making, and many past and present guests and customers would also not be seeing. However, the reality is that over the 17 years the Philips have been custodians of the hotel, ten of those have been years of austerity.

The hotel has also been subject to the disruption of being situated within a building site for some years, with no end in sight for another few years. This risk was noted by objectors to that development. The hotel is the largest employer in the parish, those employees' incomes contributing to the wealth of the locality. Many of our young people have gained invaluable experience of the working environment whilst employed in weekend and summer jobs. Visitors to the hotel undoubtedly also contribute to the local economy, frequenting the pubs, inns and cafes in the area. It has been evident in recent years that we are hosting an increasing number of visitors as holiday trends change to more short break UK based. Added to these are the increasing numbers of continental visitors enjoying the favourable exchange rates they receive. It could be argued that the increased number of visitor beds are indicative of increasing needs of the market. The hotel has been host to community events – weddings, new years parties, Christmas parties, club dinners, charity balls, christenings and wakes. It's loss will leave an enormous void in the heart of the parish and beyond. Having witnessed the effect on the community of the temporary loss

of the Finnygook, the permanent loss of the hotel would be infinitely worse. The case for supporting the development would cite the risk of the building becoming derelict if left empty. There would be a supply of housing, for which the developers will make a contribution to affordable housing within this, or an adjoining parish. The residents of those dwellings will hopefully contribute to the local economy and community. After much thought and consideration the council finally decided that to support the application was the lesser of two evils. A sad day for the parish.

#### Betty Heapy

The council was saddened to learn of the passing of Betty, who was for some time a dedicated member of the Sheviock Parish Council. In fact, it was her resignation and subsequent vacancy that drew me into the council. She will be remembered for her unfailing enthusiasm for the community in which she lived. Condolences to her family.

#### Footpaths

We are pursuing a proposal to further extend the footpath network. This is for a path between the lower junction of Sheviock Lane, alongside the A374 eastward to the junction with Ladywell Lane. Antony Estate have started preparing for the provision of another missing link.

Footpath no. 1, from the top of St Georges Lane down to the creek, has been closed by CC for repairs.

#### **Toilet Tax**

Some good news – yes, that's what I said – Cornwall Council will no longer be charging us around £800 a year tax on our toilets at Portwrinkle. Spending a penny just got cheaper!

#### Sheviock Hall Extension Approved

More good news - this could become a habit - All the hard work put in by the Hall committee came to fruition with the granting of the planning permission and consequently the grant from the Lottery Board for £72000. There was an element of misunderstanding during the Council's discussion on this application. As we, the council, hire the Bill Warren room as our office, we are therefore customers of, and thus have a material interest in, the outcome. We, the council were thus unable to submit a decision on the application. This had no bearing whatsoever on the views of the council. nor on the decision made by Cornwall Council. The fact that we recorded the support of the public there present. maybe did though, have a beneficial effect on the allotting of the grant.

#### Dog Wardens

We are pleased to welcome two new members to our team. We earlier advertised for the positions of Dog Warden for the parish. Louise Hamlyn and Gary Dyer successfully applied and are now undergoing training in their duties. Hopefully their presence around the parish will encourage the few who continue to flout dog bans and fouling laws to be more socially responsible.

#### New Year's Eve

The Memorial Hall Committee and the Parish Council have combined to make the hall available for the community to celebrate New Year's Eve. I would like to extend thanks to the committee for this most generous gesture, and also, to the Friday Night Boys, who have agreed to provide their unique and fabulous brand of entertainment. #### Jeff McGuinness

We were sad to receive Jeff's resignation from the council. His invaluable contributions will be sorely missed as he brought a level of reasoning to discussions, particularly evident in his role in the Traffic Light Trials. We wish Jeff and his family all the best for the future.

#### Betty Heapy 1941 - 2018

As many of you know, Betty was a true stalwart of this Parish. Betty moved here about 21 years ago after visiting the area and staying at the Whitsand Bay Hotel for many, many years with her husband. Colin.

After Iosina Colin she decided she would like to return to Cornwall and she bought Hillside Cottage where she was very happy and Betty immediately became a part of our community. Betty joined our local WI and was actively involved with it, being President twice, Vice President twice and then social secretary until ill health meant she had to step down from the committee. Betty embroidered the WI cushion which is now on the bench in the fover of the village hall and she also beautifully embroidered a Christmas tablecloth which comes out each year for our members meeting. Betty very much enjoyed all her craft work, knitting, sewing, tapestry and cross stitch making many beautiful items. She also made beautiful cards and I have kept each one she sent to me and the family. They were just too good to throw away.

Betty also became a member of Sheviock Parish Council for many years and in 2003 she became Chair of the Torpoint and Rame Peninsular Market and Coastal Town Initiative and following on from this Betty and her steering group put together the Sheviock Parish Plan in September 2004. Betty took up the mantle of looking for a site for an area of Peace and Tranquility where parishioners could go and sit guietly. I remember she had some opposition to this but she was a determined lady and due to her persistence we now have such an area in Sheviock Lane. Betty started up a Garden Club which is still flourishing and Betty has been its chairperson since its inception right through to the present day. The Garden Club has just installed a bench in this area and they have suggested dedicating this bench to Betty so a plague will be put there on the bench with her name on it. I know Betty would be thrilled with this. Betty was a member of the Crafthole Bowls Club and spent many years playing until ill health prevented her from playing. She lent me her bowls when I started playing, but it was not for me so her bowls are now being

used by Henry Pryn.

Betty was made a life member of the Golf Club by the Earle family at the Whitsand Bay Golf Club. Every year for the last fifteen years the Phillips family invited Betty to join them at the Whitsand Bay Hotel for Christmas. She never took it for granted she would be invited, but then when the invitation came each year she was delighted and really looked forward to Christmas. Thank you to the Phillips family for such a kind gesture.

Betty always took a pride in how she looked – it was very important to her, everything matching. She had some beautiful clothes and looked very glamorous in them.

As I said before Betty was a very strong and determined lady. If she believed in something she would not hold back on giving her opinion. There was no messing around with Betty.

Betty's cottage is like my sewing room, quite a lot of unfinished projects, some not started, some completed but the real pleasure for both of us was being in a fabric/haberdashery shop and looking at everything and then making our purchases. Betty was the queen of shopping, she loved it.

It was very sad to see Betty's health deteriorating so much and she could not do what she wanted to do, but she still had a lovely smile for everyone. The last time I took Betty out was to a WI meeting where there were some miniature therapy ponies. She thoroughly enjoyed meeting the ponies and being able to smooth them. Looking at some photographs of that afternoon you could see how poorly Betty looked, but she was determined to be there. At this point I must say a tremendous thank you to Dr Fullalove and the staff at Quay Lane Surgery in St Germans. They were always there for Betty throughout her time of ill health and we are so lucky to have such a brilliant practice at St Germans. I really miss Betty and will do so for a long, long time. She was a true genuine friend to me. I was there for Betty and Betty was there for me. What else could you wish

#### **Crafthole Community Shop**

Through the medium of this Newsletter, please allow me to take this opportunity to update you as residents of Sheviock Parish about various matters raised at our AGM in May.

- 1. Firstly, about a 'Suggestions Book' in the shop. This was pursued and actioned by the Directors. It has resulted, among other things, in a review of the fire risk in the shop premises. As a consequence, we have appointed a Fire Officer, who is currently co-ordinating with Cornwall Council re. our putting up appropriate signage, assessing the most likely causes of fire can be countered, and acquiring needful fire-fighting equipment.
- 2. Another question concerned the possibility of increasing the summer opening times. This was followed up, but sadly, owing to our not being able to raise enough volunteers to cover the extra hours, it could not be implemented. Maybe next year?
- 3. Also the Directors were asked to consider increasing the number of Members of the C.I.C., as it was thought a larger membership would allow greater involvement from the residents in the area. This question was formulated into a two-part proposal at the AGM which after seconding and by general consent was referred to the Directors to consider.

At a recent Directors' meeting, it was agreed that this increase would be beneficial to the shop. So, a two-part proposal was unanimously agreed; as

was its implementation. Namely, that 'Application for Membership' forms would be made available in the shop in the New Year for each category of potential new Members. These applications will then be considered by the Directors, and at their discretion, new Members will be added to the list of Members of Crafthole Shop C.I.C.

4. We have appointed the following people to join Rosalie Dunn and myself as Directors of the C.I.C.:- Fiona Babbage, Berenice Earnshaw, Sally Loynes, Peter McLaren and Lynn Vickery.

And, finally, may I, on behalf of the Directors, wish you all - volunteers, residents, customers and suppliers a very Happy Christmas and a truly Blessed New Year.

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
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#### **Crafthole Methodist Church**

#### **Update from St Mary's Church**



A Project's
Tale Expect the
unexpected!
Our Heritage
Gateway Project
at St Mary's is no
exception to this rule.
The Project Team
have encountered

various challenges over the past twelve months, both anticipated and unexpected. We were pleased to learn that the tower and spire is structurally safe, despite leaking like a sieve, and that the bells are sound but in need of refurbishment. We now know which species of bat reside with us, but this sets a tight programme for the repair works. We were delighted with the absence of asbestos but stunned at the unexpected costs to conserve the timber ceiling and roof bosses.

The Parochial Church Council were persuaded to open Pandora's Box by appointing consulting engineers to review the heating proposals and to advise on lighting and electrics, which had not been considered. The under-pew heaters were confirmed as the most pragmatic solution for this Grade 1 Listed building but the sting in the tail was the need to upgrade the power supply. Lighting and rewiring, so obvious that we had completely overlooked it, added yet more cost.

#### Introducing Phase 2

By the end of July we faced a maelstrom – the costs had risen by £62,000 and our funding strategy had only been partly successful. Although we had found alternative funders to Viridor, who closed our relevant landfill site, we had only secured £15,000 of the £59,000 applied for. We had a funding gap in excess of £100,000. Phasing elements of the project was the backstop, but we needed to ensure that we did not prejudice our outcomes in respect of the £212,500

Heritage Lottery funding.

Nothing drives creativity like a crisis and the PCC agreed to postpone the repairs to both ceilings, the heating, lighting and electrics to Phase 2, i.e. once we can secure the funding. This will ensure that the tower and spire are made watertight. that the kitchenette, reception area and external WC are installed and that the power is upgraded to support the new facilities. All the Heritage Interpretation outputs will be delivered. There are clear logistical benefits in combining the new lighting with the ceiling repairs and we were greatly relieved that the Heritage Lottery Fund not only accepted our proposed phasing but also encouraged us to prepare a bid to one of their new funding programmes to be launched in 2019.

#### Community Support

We have been genuinely overwhelmed by the support for this project, not so much from a community that has always been generous with its support, but for the level of enthusiasm, resources and skills you have brought. On behalf of the Project Team, I would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has supported us in whatever way – and there are so many – we would not be on the cusp of a viable project without your support.

#### Christmas Tidings of great joy?

Our second stage bid to the Heritage Lottery Fund was submitted on 29 October. The decision will be announced before Christmas and, if successful, the works contract will commence on 28 January. We are grateful to Crafthole Methodist Church for inviting us to use the Chapel for our services during the works, which will last for approximately 6 months, subject of course to whatever unexpected issues we may encounter!

#### **Public Transport Update**

#### LOCAL BUS SERVICE

Will all local bus users please note that as mentioned in my last article the last bus from Plymouth to our villages is now the 20.50 70B ex Royal parade arriving Sheviock at 21.39, Crafthole 21.42, & running through to Portwrinkle arr. 21.46. These bus times are not shown in the May Pocket Bus Timetables currently available in the Post Office & elsewhere locally, that also show the 21.50 70B ex Royal Parade as running to Crafthole, whereas it now terminates at HMS Raleigh.

I also previously mentioned that CityBus were considering ways of enabling the late evening 22.50 ex Royal Parade
- Millbrook/Insworke Bus to again call at Crafthole & the way this would probably be achieved will be for the bus to run as now to Insworke arriving at 00.02 but instead of returning to Plymouth via Torpoint & the Ferry it would return via Saltash & the Bridge calling at Crafthole at approx 00.16.

This would mean a longer than usual journey but it would give local residents the opportunity of returning by bus after attending the Theatre Royal or the

Pavilions etc. This would be certainly be very welcome by some local residents whom we have heard have caught the bus to the Tregantle Turn and walked home from there. The bus would unfortunately not serve Sheviock but passengers could alight at the Kimberley Foster Bus Stop and walk down Sheviock Lane or alight down the hill at the junction of Horsepool Road and walk along the road. Residents going to the Theatre Royal or Pavilions can catch the 17.53 70B ex Portwrinkle Bus that is scheduled to arrive Royal Parade at 19.02 in good time for shows commencing at 19.30. This proposal would also give anyone visiting the area from Plymouth a very late return bus to the City as the latest current return bus departs Crafthole at 20.27.

We have been told by City Bus that the recently revised 75 Bus Service is likely in the near future to revert to the shorter route to Liskeard and not run via St. Germans as now. Hopefully City Bus may be able then to respond to our request for most if not all of the buses to be routed via Sheviock and the Kimberley Foster Bus Stop in Crafthole.

#### LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE

Contrary to my statement in the September Newsletter I cannot see that there are any significant alterations to trains calling at St. Germans Station in the new service commencing on the 1st January 2019. However, I note that the minutes of a recent South East Cornwall Rail Meeting hosted by Sheryll Murray makes mention of an enhanced hourly service through Cornwall commencing in the May 2019 Timetable. It also stated that all the current direct Trains to London will be retained.

A new Public Transport Notice Board has been kindly erected by Michael and Robin Mathias. It is good that we now have a representative from the Cornwall Council Passenger Transport Group in Emily Dunford regularly attending all our Rame Public Transport Committee meetings as well as James Church from Plymouth City Bus. It is very helpful to hear their views and responses to applicable matters raised at our meetings.

#### **Great success for the Hall**



Lottery grant of £72,000

After hard work by the Hall Committee the Lottery Board have awarded the Hall £72,000. The grant will cover an extension to the present lounge, producing a new room with a space approximately the same as the existing lounge.

The new room will be self-contained and have a toilet and sink facility and new side entrance and be available for use even when the pre-school is open. It will be linked to the existing lounge with lockable folding doors to ensure total security for all children during their pre-school sessions. Opening the folding doors when the pre-school is not operating will create a very sizeable lounge area ideal for a wide range of courses and meetings.

We hope building will start around Easter time 2019 and expect it to last until the summer school holiday time. One part of the lottery grant is to offer, within the new premises, facilities for any training courses. In the spring we will start consultation within the community to get ideas of what you want and what courses can be arranged. Establishing and providing what the younger members of the community want is a priority. At the other end of the age range, the Computer Course, for example, which we ran in the hall earlier in the 2018 year was very well attended, maybe a return of this course will be requested.

I have plenty of squash, onions, leeks, brassicas, parsnip, beetroot and carrots for winter.

So to my travels in Green Spain, the Costa Verde, WOW! The Northern Spain I visited is the Basque Country, Cantabria, the Picos de Europa, Austurias and Galicia. A complete contrast to the Southern Costas, Small farms, interesting crops, tomatoes, peppers, beans and maize. There were snow-capped mountains, huge forests of pine and eucalyptus. Bay of Biscay fishing villages, small coves unpolluted by plastic beaches. Peach, lemon and walnut trees plus wild "Marseille" fig trees. No need to buy fruit. All this linked by a fantastic network of roads and viaducts (EU funded). Great campsites and aires too.

I saw a coal-fired power station and an enormous fish farm on the coast. There was a large waste recycling plant producing electricity at LA Coruna. The several Caminos to Santiago de Compostela were great walking and a revelation.

#### TORPOINT TOWN COUNCIL PLANS TO SECURE THE FUTURE OF THE TOWN'S LIBRARY

Torpoint Town Council has taken a step forward in securing the future of the town's library by agreeing to enter into talks with Cornwall Council about taking over management of the Fore Street building. Following a briefing session and subsequent council meeting held on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> November 2018 councillors unanimously agreed to support the vision, aims and objectives of a community hub incorporating the Library and Information Service at the existing library building. As part of the arrangement it is anticipated the Torpoint Archives will relocate from the existing town council offices and a small café will operate from within the building.

The Town Mayor, Councillor Lambert Keise, stated: "The Town Council is continuing its negotiations with Cornwall Council to take over the provision of this vital service, with the inclusion of Torpoint Archives and a small café, accompanied by extended opening times, it is hoped the facility will see an increase in visitors. Provisional financial support from Sheviock Parish Council, subject to approval from its parishioners, to support the future of Torpoint Library has been offered. Negotiations are anticipated to be completed by the beginning of March 2019 and a launch event will be planned once renovations are completed, more details on this will follow."

Under the proposals, Torpoint Library and Information Service will remain part of the countywide library service, meaning customers will keep their existing library cards and will still be able to visit, borrow and order books online from other libraries in Cornwall. Cornwall Council will continue to provide and maintain the library's public computers and resources, including replenishing books. Torpoint Library and Information Service is currently open between 9.30am and 5.00pm Monday, Wednesday and Friday and it is also open on a Saturday between 10.00am and 1.00pm, there are plans to expand the opening times when negotiations are completed.

In these challenging financial times, Cornwall Council - like all local authorities throughout the UK - has had some tough decisions to make when faced with massive cuts in funding from central Government, explained Edwina Hannaford, Cornwall Council Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods. "We want to safeguard the future for libraries across Cornwall and this is why we have been working closely with town and parish councils and community organisations to find the best custodians," she said. "I welcome the decision from Torpoint Town Council – we look forward to working with them over the next few months on transferring the library to their very capable management."

**About Cornwall Council's devolution programme:** Cornwall is the first rural authority to agree a Devolution Deal with the Government. The Cornwall Devolution Deal provided powers for Cornwall to have more say on transport, energy, health and social care, and heritage. As well as having powers devolved to Cornwall from Whitehall, Cornwall Council is also devolving services and assets to local councils, groups and organisations within Cornwall. This gives local communities more say on how local assets are used and managed. Cornwall is one of the few areas in the country where double devolution is actively being put into practice. There are over 300 new schemes already in place in the county keeping communities clean, parks open and maintained, libraries open and open-air swimming pools in full use.
