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
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Suspicious TV Licensing Emails

I would like to express my grateful thanks to all those who have given me much support, help, and goodwill during the last year when my wife Joan's health further deteriorated, mainly through the numerous infections she contracted during several months in hospitals, ending in her passing away peacefully on the 28th September.

Thanks also go to all both locally & from further afield who attended the Memorial Service for Joan held in a full St. Mary's Church on the 17th October. They included her best friend for over 76 years, who were put to sit together when they both first went to secondary school in Plymouth in 1943. An ex pupil of D.H.S. who some years ago recognised Joan in Quay Lane Surgery, well remembers being taught by Joan at the school, in the late 50's/early 60's, and a representative of a Church & associated Table Tennis Club in Reading that we left in 1985, to come back to our roots. I think that the affection shown to Joan was also typified by a local club who insisted on giving a lovely large wreath in memory of her, who when told that it was really only family flowers, answered that they were really family, so we could not argue with that! Many who attended said afterwards that they had no idea of what Joan had achieved in her early teaching career, but we are not surprised as only a few of us knew what a very modest, unassuming, and unselfish person Joan was, & that other priorities particularly her family were much more important to her than money or position.

Obviously, after over 57 years of being happily married to Joan, I am finding life difficult without her, especially as we did so many things together, but I am optimistic, that with my faith, the continued love, help and support of my family and friends, everything will as they say, gradually improve.

I have not yet been given the final amounts of the donations from the funeral directors, given to Action on Hearing Loss, & Christian Aid in memory of Joan, but the total is likely to be in region of £1,000 equally split, Blessings to you all - Geoff, Alison & Glyn, and

their families.

Peter was born in Coventry and experienced the war years. His home was destroyed by enemy bombing which meant that he was evacuated several times. On leaving school his first job was with a firm of solicitors but he spent most of his working life in finance, particularly Lloyds Bank, until his retirement.

His aptitude for sport was apparent from his teens and his love of sport sustained him throughout his life. In his teens and twenties he played lawn tennis and table tennis to County Standard and had trials for the Warwickshire Cricket team.

He met his future wife Angela, a nurse, when he was admitted to Warwick Hospital for surgery.

They were married in 1957. Their daughter Jane born in 1959 followed by Simon in 1961.

On retirement Peter and Angela moved to Crafthole to be near Jane and family who lived in Landrake. He loved his life here in this friendly community playing golf and table tennis locally, making many new friends along the way.

Although in poor health in his latter years he never ceased to be keenly interested in everything that occurred in the Parish and supported in any way that he could. Car Park Winter Pass The missus was delighted to receive her Christmas gift of a Winter pass last year. A bargain at only £5, available from the Clerk's Office.

Changes to Parking Arrangements. We have received the go-ahead to move the parking bays on Finnygook Lane, thus removing the pinch point opposite the South West Water build out. Additionally, the Disabled designated parking bay in West Lane is to be de-restricted.

Only Poo Down the Loo. Yet again the main road is suffering from sewage overflow. We previously published a plea from SWW which advised against putting wipes and anything else that was not toilet paper or poo down the loo.

The Temporary Traffic Lights in use during the recent road works appeared to work incredibly well. This inevitably led to calls for another look at a permanent installation. The three way system required constant monitoring by a marshal at each light. A permanent system would require parking restrictions within the boundaries of the controlled area. So all in all, an impracticality.

VE Day Celebrations. We have been asked about plans for the forthcoming VE Day celebrations. This will be 8 May 2020 so you may wish to assemble a committee to arrange a community response. The council will be pleased to assist in any arrangements.

Climate Change Declaration

Following Cornwall County Council's declaration of a Climate Emergency, Sheviock Parish Council are committing resources and activity to ensure that we are doing what we can to preserve the natural environment, for the benefit of ourselves and our descendants. We all need to dramatically reduce the production of greenhouse gases and CO2 or face the consequences of flooding, food shortages, the desertification of vast tracts of the planet and the mass migration north from areas that become uninhabitable.

The measures that we need to take will require the reduction of unsustainable travel, unnecessary consumption and better food management. Less of anything that directly or indirectly causes CO2 to be released into the atmosphere.

There are a number of actions the parish can take as a body, and as individuals.

Whilst not directly a cause of climate change, Sheviock Parish Council has begun by asking the various food and retail outlets in the parish to reduce the sale of drinks in plastic bottles and partaking in a water refill policy, to offer water refills to personal water bottles.

We would like to consider a multitude of initiatives to preserve our local and global environment but we need your help.

To start to change how we live, we would like to form a Climate Change Emergency Community Working Party from within the parish. The working party would consider initiatives and ensure they were delivered. We would like to attract a cross section of ages, gender and ethnicity who would be prepared to take responsibility for small projects within the community. It might be as simple as putting posters up on notice boards or as complex as attracting funding for an Electric Vehicle charging point.

In September we visited Bowringsleigh Gardens at Kingsbridge, supporting St Lukes's Open Gardens. Bowringsleigh is home to a stunning collection of hydrangeas and many rare trees are to be found in the two large arboretums which are best viewed in September as the



leaves turn colour. It was a beautiful sunny day enjoyed by us all.

In October Trevor Wiltshire visited us to talk about his Pencarn Garden at Gonvena, Wadebridge. Sited on a tree-covered, SW facing hillside, a lovely 1 acre plantsman's garden with a Mediterranean themed section, large pond, rock garden, plant collections and unusual plants in raised beds, small cliffs and stone hedges planted with alpines. Hopefully we will be visiting next spring.



In November Aaron Southgate (Head Gardener) visited us to talk about Buckfast Abbey

Gardens. Nestled in the shadow of Dartmoor in a beautiful wooded valley beside the River Dart, Buckfast Abbey gardens are a tranquil refuge. Spacious lawns, a lavender garden, Physic Garden, Sensory garden and the



wonderful Millennium Show garden. Aaron explained how an organic and ecologically sensitive policy was operated on the gardens, creating compost, mulch-mow for lawns for self feeding, compost tea and a biological approach to pest control. A fascinating talk and a beautiful place to visit.

The memory of the last meeting is tinged with sadness with the realisation that, for many of us, that was to be the last time we were to see Chris. Chris was an avid supporter and contributor of the garden club and will be greatly missed. Our thoughts are with Gill and family.

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Local Public Transport Update

LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE FROM ST. GERMANS STATION – The much promoted & awaited improved train service commences on the 15th December, and as previously mentioned in this column St. Germans will have a greatly improved frequency of trains calling at the station. On the up eastbound line to Plymouth and beyond, on Monday to Fridays 22 trains will stop each day, & on the down westbound line to Penzance no less than 27 trains will call. There are no longer any significant gaps in the service with at least one train an hour and often 2 trains an hour stopping at the station.

UP LINE TRAINS MONDAYS-to-FRIDAYS calling at: 07.22EXE, 07.43PAD, 08.22CDF, 08.50PAD, 09.29, 10.28EXE, 11.33, 12.28CDF, 12.53, 13.32, 14.28EXE, 14.53, 15.28, 16.27, 16.57, 1728EXE, 18.28CDF, 1853, 1953EXE, 20.34, 20.56EXE, 2153. All trains commence their journey from Penzance. Trains terminate at Plymouth except where otherwise shown. CDF — Cardiff Central, EXE — Exeter St. Davids, & PAD — London Paddington.

HIGHLIGHTS - Apart from the through trains to Paddington there will be connections at Plymouth to 10 other trains to the capital ranging from 5 to 30 minutes. There will also be more connections available at Plymouth to trains for the Midlands, the North and Scotland e.g. 18 minutes on to the 08.25 ex Plymouth to Edinburgh & Glasgow, and 18 minutes on to the 09.27 ex Plymouth to Edinburgh & Aberdeen, and ranging from 8 to 42 minutes on to other services. There will be 3 through trains to Cardiff.

DOWN LINE TRAINS TO PENZANCE MONDAYS-to-FRIDAYS calling at:-06.32, 06.56, 07.27, 07.58(ex Exe) 0834(BTL), 0902, 0937(BTL), 10.02(PAD), 10.34, 11.01(EXE), 12.01(CDF), 12.34, 13.03(EXE), 14.00, 14.32, 15.01(EXE), 1601 16.23, 17.03(CDF), 17.22*, 17.37(PAD), 18.01(EXE), 18.53, 19.45(PAD), 20.48(PAD), 22.03(CDF), 22.54(PAD FO) *only runs

to Liskeard, all other trains run through to Penzance.

Trains commence their journeys from Plymouth except where otherwise shown in brackets. Additional connections will be available at Plymouth from trains coming from Paddington, Scotland, the Midlands & the North. There will be 3 through trains from Cardiff.

HIGHLIGHTS include 2 additional through trains from London calling at St. Germans with the early morning 06.37 ex Paddington train stopping at 10.02, & a train we had previously for several years unsuccessfully tried to get to stop, that is the 16.04 ex Paddington, which will call at 19.45.

SATURDAY SERVICES – Although not so significant as on weekdays there are several additional trains particularly on the up line where 21 trains will now call. HIGHLIGHTS include 2 through trains to Paddington at 07.48 & 08.51. plus 3 through trains to Cardiff in each direction. Like on Mondays to Fridays there are additional connections available at Plymouth to trains operating to & from Paddington as well as the North, the Midlands & Scotland. SUNDAY SERVICES - Comparatively a bit disappointing with little change. There is one additional train on the up line with an earlier starting time from St. Germans of 10.31 but there is no longer a through train to Paddington.

New St. Germans Timetable Leaflets should be available soon in the Crafthole Post Office.

LOCAL BUS SERVICE - Tender bids to operate grant aid bus services for the next eight years in Cornwall have been submitted to Cornwall Council, and the results will be known in January. This is very important to our local communities as it applies to all our bus routes West of HMS Raleigh. From what we have heard, we have been given no reason to think there will be any serious cuts to our current very good bus service, but this could all change if say Stagecoach won the new contracts & not CityBus.

Firstly, this week I received a **THANK YOU** letter from a frequent visitor to
Crafthole.



Teresa Colrein President There's a simple pink plaque in the park to mark a long forgotten day, when the people of Plymouth made their mark in a bloody Civil War affray.

Where it stands, all around, men were dying. Screams of pain, pleas for help, rent the air. Where it stands, in their blood, they were trying to beat oppression and a King with no care.

Men, women, and boys with no warring background,

stood their ground, met his force toe to toe. Had they failed their Government would be illfound.

Undemocratic, and in a Country of woe.

So they fought to the death many of them, but they held the King's men on this field. Then they counter attacked smashing through them.

scattering his soldiers. Making them yield.

Colonel Gould in the thick of the action, fought with fury, none greater than him. And he led the fight with his warring faction, pushing the enemy back into the Plym.

Hundreds drowned trying to escape the slaughter, sinking down with the weight of their gear. Still more died on the bank of that water cut to pieces by Plymouth men with no fear.

For a Parliament and Democracy they fought.
For Freedom they held, live or die.
And had they not stood and shed blood as taught
then Great Britain would have suffered, you and I.
Freedom Fields battle was a free World's salvation,
forgotten now by all but a few.

But remember, it helped forge a great nation of free men and women., me and you.

In the British Civil War where Oliver Cromwell and his Roundheads represented Parliament and Freedom, fought King Charles and his Cavaliers representing Royal dictatorship and continuing slavery, Plymouth, Devon held out for Parliament. In the south west Plymouth stood alone. All around this famous harbour town, the Country was occupied by Royalist forces and their supporters. The town was under siege for over three years. The conflicts fought were viscous skirmishes, commando type raids, and pitched battles. The Battle of Freedom Fields the most famous of the siege.

In all Plymouth's siege actions ordinary men, women, and children in 'Trained Bands' fought

against Royalist professional troops. Many died, but their resistance, courage, and sacrifice helped this Country eventually achieve a Democratic Parliament, one that has been called The Mother of all Parliaments. It can be argued that the siege ensured civil war victory, Cromwell's forces the stronger against the weakened King's forces because of Plymouth's resistance.


At the north end of Freedom Fields Park stands a square stone column, on each of the four faces a thin pink marble slab with Gold lettering records the battle. It reads: West face; Commander for Parliament Colonel Wardlaw; East face; General for the King Prince Maurice; North face, Fought in the Mayoralty of John Cawse 1643, Commemorated on the Mayoralty of J.T.Bond 1891; South face: "Upon this spot on Sunday December 3rd 1643, after hard fighting for several hours, the Roundhead garrison of Plymouth made their final rally and routed the Cavalier army that had surprised the Outworks and well nigh taken the town.

For many years it was the custom to celebrate the anniversary of this victory, long known as the Sabbath Day Fight, and recorded as 'The Great Deliverance' of the protracted siege successfully sustained by Troops and Townsfolk on behalf of the Parliament against the King under great hardships for more than three years."

From the Parliament the people of Plymouth fought for evolved other great democracies. Other peoples triumphed over tyranny. Other Countries have followed the example of the people of Plymouth, with their men, women, and children standing against their own unacceptable Governments and rulers. And you and I, along with millions of others, are free because of what ordinary folk did during the long siege of Plymouth, England, and at their final Battle of Freedom Fields on December 3rd 1643, a conflict that was called 'The Sabbath Day Fight.'

Plymouth people have fought for freedom since that time, many making the ultimate sacrifice. With the reckless abandon of Governments who have not known war on their own soil, successive British Governments have now reduced our Armed Forces to a dangerous low. I fear Great Britain can no longer stand a war of attrition for more than a few days, and the men, women and children of Plymouth may once again have to fight for their lives and this Country's freedom as a result of dis-armament in this very unstable World.

In the present unstable situation, it is very wrong to move the Royal Marines away from their Plymouth base and the protection of the Royal Navy at HMNB Plymouth. It is also very wrong to even consider reducing their numbers.



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
