A Plymothian by birth he and Ann chose our community as the place where they wanted to make their home and bring up their family. I first met Steve when, as little girls, he began to bring Jennifer and Philippa to church. Always ready to help, he soon became an invaluable member of the church family. From the beginning he took an active part in the services, carrying the processional cross when necessary and he held the Bishop's permission to assist the priest at Holy Communion. This role included taking Holy Communion to the elderly and the infirm in their own homes and for many years he visited the residential homes in Torpoint and District where he would lead a simple service and give communion to all who wished to receive it. Steve served on the Parochial Church Council and worked hard to help with multitude of tasks necessary for the smooth running of the church. He became churchwarden and fulfilled this role, perhaps the most onerous duty a layperson can undertake within the local church, with the greatest care and consideration. He shared the vision for the way ahead for St Mary's and from its inauguration, he was a member of the project team, celebrating with us the successful completion of the first phase last summer.

Steve's early career was in Devonport Dockyard. When he retired from this, he trained as a teacher and put his energy and enthusiasm into working with children with special educational needs where he was highly valued by the children, their parents and his colleagues. After his second retirement, he had more time to offer to the church and the parish and he worked in the community shop in those early days when we were still finding our way and the till had a mind of its own!!!

And now, of course, he also had more time to spend with his family. Ann, Jennifer and Philippa were always at the centre of Steve's life. He and Ann have shared a lifetime of memories. They enjoyed walking and gardening together, early in their marriage they had discovered the Isles of Scillies and they visited each year. More recently they also enjoyed holidays in North Italy. Steve was always so proud of Jennifer and Philippa and the time he spent with his grandson, Arthur, brought him great joy.

With the death of Steve, the parish has been bereaved of a kind and gentle man with the highest of principles and strongest of faiths. We shall miss him greatly. We send our love and condolences to Ann and the family and pray that he may he rest in peace.

So as the collectors were stopped from walking round the village, meeting you all, this year, I thought I would name and thank them all here.



Don't forget, if you need anything, there are plenty willing and able to help.



Local Public Transport Update

After a few weeks with an emergency bus service of just three No. 75 Buses operating each way, we have been back to our full normal 70B & 75 Bus service since the 30th May with over 30 buses passing through Crafthole on weekdays en route to Torpoint, Plymouth, Liskeard, Portwrinkle and the Rame Peninsula. However for three days from Monday 30th March we had no bus service at all as originally we were not given an emergency bus service as it was based on Sunday Service Bus Levels. We were only advised about this late on Friday 27th March but immediately protested very strongly about this to Plymouth CityBus & Cornwall Council and thanks to great prompt support from Cornwall Councillors, Sheviock Parish Council and members of our RPPTUG, an emergency 75 Bus service serving all our three villages was up & running by Thursday 2nd April, operating between Liskeard & Torpoint but with good connections to & from Royal Parade & Derriford Hospital, It was thought very important that we had a bus service not only during Covid 19 but for the future. The new Buses in Cornwall Handy guide operative valid from 6th July is now available as usual from the Crafthole Post Office & Community Shop and The Telephone Tourist Information Kiosk etc.

A few points to note in the new timetable are:- The 1445 from Royal Parade is as usual a 70B Bus running through to Portwrinkle on all Saturdays and during School Holidays, but it is a No. 70 on Schooldays when you will need to change at Torpoint Community College on to a No. 75 to take you to our villages. A good tip is that whilst there is a gap shown in the time table from 1645 until 1820 for a bus from Royal Parade to our villages, passengers for Crafthole (Finnygook Stop only) can catch the 1715 No. 70A Bus to Torpoint (Rowing Club Stop) arrive 1754 and change on to the 1802 No. 75 Bus arriving at the Finnygook at 1823. In the No. 75 Bus Service we now have 3 of the 5 buses from Liskeard to Torpoint departing Liskeard Lloyds Bank at 0719/0724, 1414 & 1644 that now all call additionally at Portwrinkle, the Kimberly Foster Stop In Crafthole and at Sheviock as well as at the Finnygook as usual. Unfortunately in the reverse direction only the 1524 ex Torpoint-Liskeard Bus on Schooldays calls at all the bus stops in our villages. NATIONAL EXPRESS COACHES have since July 1st been operating a restricted service of three coaches daily from Penzance that call Tideford Bus Shelter at 0907, 1415 & 2315 en route to London Victoria Coach Station via Heathrow Airport. Return Services depart daily from London Victoria at 0830 (arrive Tideford 1440), 1330 (arrive 1950) & 2300 (arrive 0525). The two day time services (504) run non stop from Plymouth to Heathrow Airport each way except for a service station stop. Book online or 'phone 08717818181. LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE FROM ST. GERMANS STATION. GWR are operating a reduced but substantial service. However, it needs to be remembered that with social distancing, trains are only able to carry a fraction (currently about a third) of normal capacity. GWR are aiming to uplift capacity and service levels, so customers need to check timetables regularly. Current Train Service operating until at least the 2nd week in September:-

MONDAYS TO FRIDAYS – Up Line to Plymouth & Beyond 0722, 0743 PAD, 0850 PAD, 0928, 1028, 1052 PAD, 1133, 1228, 1333, 1428, 1453, 1528, 1657, 1728, 1853, 1953, 2028, 2057, 2130, 2153. Down Line to Penzance:- 0557, 0727, 0834 (0526 ex BTL), 0902, 0937(0637 exBTL), 1034, 1101, 1234, 1402, 1431, 1501, 1601, 1647, 1737 (1404 exPad), 1801, 1917, 1949, (1604 exPad), 2048,(1704exPad), 2136(1804exPad), 2203, 2254FO. It is possible to get to London Paddington before 10.00 in the morning by catching the 05.57 down train as far as Liskeard arrive 0608, change over the platform to the 0617 ex Liskeard (Golden Hind) train to Paddington arrive 0959.

SATURDAYS – 17 trains calling on up line from 0721 to 2251 and 14 on the down line from 0755 to 2042. Through trains to Paddington at 0748, 0849, 1154, 1252 &1628. Through trains from Paddington arriving at 1232 (0902exPadd) & 2042 (1703exPad) Notes – FO -Fridays only PAD – London Paddington, BTL - Bristol Temple Meads. All other trains shown are local trains operating to & from Plymouth & Exeter to & from Penzance

SUNDAYS – 8 trains calling on the up line from 1056 to 2208, and 8 on the down line from 0917 to 1951. Through train to Paddington at 1056. I understand that GWR have started to reintroduce catering on a small number of its services, but I have been able to trace, whether any of our trains to & from Paddington are included

GENERAL – Since Early July Public Transport can be used again for Leisure purposes and not restricted to essential use only. Such leisure ferry services as the Cawsand – Barbican, and the Mt.Edgecumbe to Royal William Yard & Barbican Services are all up & running their full summer services again but are only able to carry 50% of their usual no of passengers. Please remember face coverings must be used when travelling in England by Public Transport and in substantially enclosed areas of Public Transport such as rail, bus & coach stations. Stay safe by sitting at least two metres apart. Board & disembark one person at a time. Pay fares with contactless cards if possible. Wash hands before and after travelling. Do not travel if feeling unwell. Plan ahead and consider travelling at off peak times.

I had an email from David Edwards last week, who has been the Transport Coordination Service Manager for Cornwall and the leading authority on Public Transport in Cornwall for many years, having spent almost all his career in Cornwall Transport. He wrote to advise me and our RPPTUG, that he is retiring at the end of August, and to say farewell and thank "us for the time we have spent working together" with him. He did mention that our group clearly "want the best out of public transport for our area" and that "Cornwall needs more groups like yours." Effects on the shop during the Covid 19 period

As a small local shop, we have adhered to the changing Government Guidelines to prevent the spread of the virus. Early on we had a screen installed at the counter to protect both volunteers and customers: we limited numbers in the shop and the Post Office section: social distancing was

On behalf of my fellow directors, I would like to say a very BIG THANK YOU to all who have stepped to the mark and continue to help us keep the shop open; albeit with revised opening hours. Also to Shay for delivering the papers to those who were unable to collect from the shop.

At the beginning of the 'lock down' period the directors were in discussions about the possible purchase of a Card Machine. Despite the difficulties in not being able to physically meet, we have communicated by phone and email in coming to a decision for the purchase of a Clover Mini device with accessories using the money from the Grant and the Turkey Raffle. This was installed about six weeks ago. Many thanks

> to all the directors and especially to Peter, Rosalie and Ellen in the choice of device and permission to purchase as well as other WIFI equipment including fitting of a BT fibre optic connection. Having this facility has resulted in a considerable increase in takings for the months of July and August.

As to the future, we are as much in the

dark as everyone else, but it looks like we will be affected by Covid 19 restrictions well into next year. One matter we need to rearrange is the AGM postponed from May owing to Covid. Dependent on the latest guidelines, we are thinking of having an AGM by the end October/early November



Defibrilators

Repeated from the last issue as we're still being asked.

We have received comments on using the defib. units. It has been noted that it is unclear as to how to use these devices.

We have therefore had the following instructions printed, which will be affixed to the boxes.

Instruction to obtain Portable AED (defibrillator) from External box

- •Grip either side of external box, near top
- Pull towards you and down.
- A loud alarm will sound, to warn that protective exterior box is open
- Remove portable defib. unit (and additional cardboard box of child size electrodes if required).

Adult electrodes are already connected within the closed unit.

- Close exterior box, to turn off alarm -if have time.
- Call 999 if not already done so.
- Take defib. unit to patient,
- Open up box and follow instructions shown.
- Follow audible instructions, given by the the defib. unit, once turned on.



Heritage Gateway at Sheviock Parish Church

The benefit of working with Heritage projects

is the perspective they bring. Sheviock Parish Church, dedicated in 1259, witnessed the arrival of bubonic plague, later known as the Black Death, to Wevmouth in Dorset in 1348. The estimate of its impact, interestingly based on the replacement of new clergymen, suggests a clerical death rate of around 40%, which is consistent with the fall in population of



To end this perspective on a good note, the late 1300s and 1400s was a time of opportunity as Cornwall's economy diversified and grew faster than elsewhere.

So, we started this year with great expectations of our pre-pandemic fund raising programme, but the first two events fell victim to this far reaching pandemic. There will be no special pleading for the Heritage Gateway at Sheviock Parish Church. Along with hundreds of other charities, we have seen our income for the Heritage Gateway evaporate. To mitigate this, we successfully applied for a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund towards building costs for this year which has, in effect, replaced £4,400, 68% of our predicted fundraised income.

Steady - if painfully slow - progress is being made to resolve our drainage issues and the collapse of the boundary wall to the east. We

are currently seeking the necessary permissions for our new drainage strategy and replacement boundary wall and have already started grant applications in what has become a very COVID oriented funding environment. Finally, I would like to reflect on the huge contribution of two members of The Friends of St Mary's who have recently died.

Margaret Bartlett and Steve Harbour. It is hard to recall any event for the Heritage Gateway - and indeed for many years before that - when they were not there, front of house, and always amongst the first to volunteer. The current conundrum – without the aid of a crystal ball - is to decide what our fundraising programme will look like for 2021. But whatever it is, I know that Margaret and Steve will still be there with us in spirit and providing much needed inspiration when our reserves are low.

Somehow his father appeared on the track beside him and said "You

don't have to do this." Derek replied "Yes I do." "Then we'll do it together" said Mr Redmond senior, and supported Derek to finish the race. Realising they had witnessed something very special the stadium erupted in a standing ovation. He ain't heavy, he's my son.

When the world has been dealing with a pandemic rather than celebrating the achievements of so many at the planned Tokyo Games, few things bring honour in life than achieving at the highest level in sport. Yet these instances remind us of another kind of honour, as people selflessly come alongside to love and support those struggling with life. This year there have been countless examples of people doing just that, sometimes at great cost to themselves. In the New Testament, Paul encouraged the Galatian Christians to carry each other's burdens and so honour Jesus. All sisters and brothers in the human race may hold others in love and hope.
