#### Application to Close the Churchyard for Burials - Update

As reported in the last Newsletter, Sheviock Parochial Church Council announced its decision to apply to the Ministry of Justice to close St Mary's Churchyard for burials. Please

be assured that **the** 

churchyard will remain open and accessible to all as it is now, but we no longer have the space for further burials. We are now very pleased to report that the Carew Pole Family have very generously consented to release reserved land within the churchyard which will enable us to create

a Memorial Path to the West of the Church. This will provide space for the interment of nearly 60 cremated remains which, in addition to the right for interment within family graves (subject to there being

sufficient space) will provide several more years' capacity within our churchyard.
We now need to apply to the Diocese for permission (a Faculty) to create this memorial

path, but are hopeful that its location, design and benefit will be acceptable to the Diocesan Advisory Committee. St Mary's Church needs to fund this development – as yet we have not received budget costs – so once again, we will be dependent upon support from our local community to help us to achieve our aim. #### **Local Public Transport Update**

LOCAL BUS SERVICES — As from the 6<sup>th</sup> September all school bus services in our area will revert to being able to carry adult fare paying passengers. This will include the new extended 172 Torpoint - Callywith College (Bodmin) Service. On the outward journey on schooldays only, this bus will depart from Torpoint Ferry at 07.15, only stopping in our parish at The Cross, Crafthole at 07.31, & then running via Downderry, Widegates, East Looe, Pelynt & East Taphouse to arrive at the college at 08.57. The return journey will depart Callywith College at 16.25, calling East Looe Surgery at 17.10, Downderry at 17.31 before arriving at The Cross at 17.42, terminating at Torpoint Ferry at 18.01. Due to anticipated additional student numbers using the route, an additional school bus is to be deployed between Millbrook & Torpoint Community College in the mornings and afternoons. Other welcome news is that the Parish Council has purchased a much needed new replacement bus shelter with a free standing bench, that is due to be erected at The Cross in the near future, thanks in part to the P.C. being successful in obtaining a bus shelter grant from Cornwall Council.

NATIONAL EXPRESS COACHES etc. – There is further good news in that since the 2<sup>nd</sup> August National Express have been operating coaches in Cornwall to & from Birmingham for the first time since Covid restrictions commenced in March 2020. This reopens up much more of the N.E. network from Cornwall, as from Birmingham you can connect into their services operating to & from the North East, North West & Scotland. Consequently there are now five daily services calling at the Tideford Bus Shelters in the up direction, namely the 00.48 & the 10.30 to Birmingham plus the 06.15, 14.30 & 22.33 to London Victoria via Heathrow Airport. Similarly there are five daily return bus services that call at Tideford en route to Penzance. Unfortunately National Express again did not give any advance notice about the services to Birmingham, so anyone making enquiries on the N. E. Website up to only a few days before the 2<sup>nd</sup> August, would not have been made aware of the important impending changes. From Plymouth Coach station there are of course other additional National Express Coach Services to London & Birmingham as well the frequent Stagecoach Falcon Bus Service to Bristol Airport & City Centre where it connects into Stagecoach Megabus Services to London, Cardiff, Birmingham, Manchester & Sunderland. LOCAL TRAIN SERVICE FROM ST. GERMANS STATION etc. - Due to staff shortages arising from track & trace, with some train crew staff testing positive and forced to stay at home, GWR have been operating a temporary revised timetable. On Mondays to Fridays this has only resulted in one train each way being cancelled that call at St. Germans, and one train to & from Plymouth to Paddington. At the time of writing it appears these trains will be reinstated in September, with the normal timetable operating, but as always please check your train times before travelling.

OTHER NEWS - Our Rame Peninsula Public Transport Users AGM was held on the 22<sup>nd</sup> June both as a Zoom, and a face to face meeting in the Antony Village Hall. Apart from representatives from Torpoint Town & Local Parish Councils, others taking part included as usual, James Church from Go Cornwall Bus, the two principal Cornwall Passenger Transport Officers in Melanie Watson the new Lead officer and Nick Truscott, as well as local Cornwall Councillor Kate Ewert. As mentioned in the last newsletter the proposal for a new demand responsive bus service based at St. Germans Station was discussed, and the St. Germans & Area Passenger Transport Group are now progressing a feasibility study based on extensive public surveys etc. Bearing in mind the Government's new £3 Billion Bus Strategy in which Cornwall Council, like other local authorities have in conjunction with local bus companies, a duty to put forward Bus Service Improvement Plans that they have to publish by the end of October, we took the opportunity to put forward some suggestions. These included:- (i) a proposed improved No. 75 Bus Service that would give Downderry & Seaton with a population of 1,300, who rely on the 75 as their only regular daily bus route, a better service that would include at least two through buses on weekdays each way to Plymouth, (ii) The reinstatement of a Sunday Bus Service from Plymouth to Looe/Polperro, via Torpoint, Portwrinkle, Downderry & Seaton, possibly linked to a special day ticket enabling holders to use the railway in one direction between Looe & Plymouth. We continued to press for the reinstatement of the late night bus service from Plymouth to call at Sheviock & Crafthole, and for the need of RPTI (Real passenger Time Information) at locations in our RPPTUG Area where this important facility has not yet been installed. However it needs to be stated that most of our area has a very good bus service provided by one of the best operators in Go Cornwall Bus, part of the Go Ahead Group. The next RPPTUG Committee Meeting will be held on the 19th October in the Freathy Community Hall. Please remember that travellers are being encouraged to still wear face masks on Public Transport, that makes it safer for everyone.

#### **Sheviock Parish**

There continues to be a vacancy for a councillor. Currently we have want of a representative for Portwrinkle, but we will welcome interest from any suitable applicant.

A candidate for a Parish or Town Council is qualified if:

he or she is a British citizen, Commonwealth citizen, citizen of the Irish Republic, or a citizen of another European Union State.

has attained 18 years of age, and is either: in the register of electors for that Parish/Town or has during the whole of the preceding twelve months.

occupied land as owner or tenant had a principal place of work there resided in or within 4.8 kilometres of it.

We have now resumed real live face to face parish council meetings.

Special measures may still be in force regarding numbers of attendees, social distancing and such like. These will be set out on the agenda, so please take careful note

before attending. We are now meeting in the Kennedy Room of the Sheviock Memorial Hall, and, we meet on the second Monday of the month at 7 o'clock. We normally do not meet during August.

We felt it necessary to close the Portwrinkle toilet block at night. It was found that overnight camping led to toilet waste tanks being emptied down the pans. The resulting mess our staff were faced with

in the mornings was unacceptable so measures had to be taken.

As ever, the thoughtless few spoil things for the majority.

It's time again for the **Autumn Parish Clean.** This will be on Saturday
September 25<sup>th</sup>. As before, we may wish to have a group project, maybe a beach

clean; tidy up a particular area, maybe the gardens by the car park; the bus shelters; overgrown pathways, just the kerb outside your house. Whatever you do, do it safely.

#### **Bus Shelter**

After years of repairing and bodging the bus shelter at the Cross, we've purchased a new one.

I well remember Paul Hambly carrying out repairs on the shelter, usually following a storm, over 20 years ago. Then back in the year we were tasked with securing the roof, which was showing signs of sailing off over the village at the next blow.

That was the sign that it was time for a replacement. So a nice shiny new bus shelter has been ordered, it should be here very soon.

We have applied for a grant from Cornwall Council to contribute to the cost. Also during installation, a new timetable case will be provided at Portwrinkle bus shelter.

As you will have read elsewhere in this issue we had a great day on 7<sup>th</sup> August with the official opening of the Finnygook Way footpath. The fine weather added to the feel good factor as folk ventured out, many for the first time since lock down, to join in the festivities. Many thanks to Rosalie and Gill for carrying out the cutting of the ribbon.

It was 20 months since the path was actually finished. It was also 2 years and a day since David Dunn's memorial service at St. Marys. The gathering were unperturbed by the garishly garbed golfer who, despite the golf club advising all players likely to be in the area at the time, decided to advise us in a somewhat manic fashion, we were on a golf course.

Never the less, with the path well and truly open, we then gathered at the memorial totem .

Here were two plaques remembering two of my predecessors - David Dunn and Chris Kennedy - former chairmen of the parish council. They were both also deeply involved in the area's footpath network. Chris was brush cutting at the beginning of the work on Finnygook Way.

Having un-veiled the plaques, with words penned by our Clerk, Nancy, we then walked up to the Memorial Hall for a picnic party. My heartfelt thanks to all who helped set up and then tidy up at the end; Warren for his un paralleled skills in the construction and installation of the totem; Paula who, singlehandedly saw to the catering as well as setting and clearing up; Nancy for organising the details necessary for any successful get together; the Hall committee for their generous donation of the hall; Diana who produced the amazing drapes that covered the plaques; the Friday Night Boys who, sounding as good as ever, helped everyone ease back into the joy of being part of a community; Paul Stone and Rosalie for presenting the Garden Competition prizes and finally every single one of you who came along to join the fun.

So it has been a year and a half or more since our last event of any kind. It's now time to start getting back to where we left off.

Did you realise it has been over a year since England's 10,000+ village halls were forced to shut their doors for the first time. The closure of our building left our rural communities without a place to gather and put a stop to activities and events which help sustain our village life.

For our village and community hall it is clear that all community events and activities and private hires will be able to take place, with risks managed by the hirers/users e.g., through ventilation, encouraging social distancing, hand washing and use of hand sanitiser.

It remains important for us all to respect and be considerate of those who are more vulnerable and who may wish to take a more cautious approach so it will be appropriate at some activities or events that measures (including wearing face masks and social distancing) are taken so that people who are clinically more vulnerable or not yet fully vaccinated can attend. Good ventilation (or holding activities outdoors) is the best means of reducing risk of transmission. So it will be important to take advantage of the better weather in order to enable more vulnerable people to enjoy activities with minimal anxiety.

The hall committee expects community groups will be eager to make use of village halls as restrictions are lifted but asks them to respect the approach that volunteer management committees take to reopening. Please note the following:-

If you are planning to hire the **Sheviock Memorial Hall** then you will be welcome and your support very much appreciated, but please bear with the Committee whilst they strive to put all the necessary precautions in place.

A quote from ACRE, "All Village halls are registered charities run by volunteers; they

may be taking a cautious approach to opening their hall and consequently their community to the public again. These buildings are used by a range of organisations, many supporting vulnerable people, who need to be safe and secure. Where you have specific questions and have a national body for your activity or service then please refer to them. There are different Government Guidance and Regulations for different businesses and venues and these have been found to be contradictory in some areas. In essence, we expect legal restrictions will no longer apply, however government guidance on Covid safe measures will continue to be issued. This is because the Government is now stressing the need for people to "make informed decisions and act carefully and proportionately to manage risk to themselves and others"

Our briefing note recommends that all hall users continue to take steps that keep vulnerable residents safe, whether that be maintaining well-ventilated spaces or encouraging users to wear face masks.

<u>Government guidance</u> will set out how people can manage the risks to themselves and to others including:-

- 1. Meeting in well-ventilated areas where possible, such as outdoors or indoors with windows open.
- 2. Wearing a face covering where you come into contact with people you don't normally meet in enclosed and crowded spaces.
- 3. Washing your hands with soap and water or using hand sanitiser regularly throughout the day.
- 4. Covering your nose and mouth when you cough and sneeze.
- Staying at home if unwell, to reduce the risk of passing on other illnesses onto friends, family, colleagues, and others in your community.
- 6. Considering individual risks, such as clinical vulnerabilities and vaccination status.

New Start Rev. Iris Bray



The first day of term has arrived. Yet this is not just the first day of term, it is the first day of school – ever. The first day of the school-day routine commences as the new uniform is taken off the hanger and put on for real this time rather than simply being checked for size. The new school bag is packed. It's a brand new start for thousands of four year old children across the country.

In the course of a life-time we rarely have the opportunity to enjoy such a deep and significant brand-new start. Other such significant events could include starting a new job, moving to a new house in a new area, or beginning a new close personal relationship.

We could feel emerging into life after the pandemic is like a brand new start in life. For many there will be a new way of continuing with their duties. For some there will now be a permanent expectation of the previously temporary arrangements to work from home. For others there may be a whole new form of employment, or still others, sadly, their previous employment may no longer be there for them and they must seek employment elsewhere, potentially prompting a change of career as a very different brand new start.

Whatever the circumstances, a brand new start can be a bit scary. It is a daunting prospect to face unfamiliar or even unchartered territories. Yet it can also be exciting as in every case a brand new start offers the potential not only to leave the past behind, but also to paradoxically carry it forward with us as we continue to learn, to develop, to grow, into the new future which beckons with anticipation and promise, hopes and dreams.

Christians believe we may not be restricted to the milestones of life to enjoy the potential of a brand new start. For the Christian message of Jesus offers this gift every day. Paul writes to the Christians in Corinth "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, the new creation has come: the old has gone, the new is here!" And in Peter's letter we read "Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead." The stories we read in the Bible give many examples of a brand new start, in the Old Testament we read the stories of Noah and the Ark, and the people of Israel making a brand new start in the Promised Land, and in the New Testament, those who like Levi and Zacchaeus embarked on a brand new start in life in the intentional decision to follow Jesus.

So it is my prayer that whatever our circumstances, and whatever form it may take, the brand new starts we may face will bring excitement and opportunity, the possibility of promise fulfilled, and to be inspired with good and fruitful hopes and dreams as we continue to learn, and live and most of all, love.
