Beach-Cleaning Birds and Buoys

Thank you to EVERYONE who has helped since January at our monthly community beach cleans - 37 individuals putting in a collective 48 appearances so far (as at the end of April). Your time, effort and dedication in helping to tackle plastic pollution in our little corner of this beautiful planet are praiseworthy! I often wonder how many pieces of plastic we have prevented injuring or killing wildlife.

I expect the type of litter on our beaches to change over the next few months as we welcome more beach users. Unfortunately I have noticed an increase in the amount of dog mess on the beach so please do take care.

We meet at Portwrinkle Harbour Beach/Hoodny Cove once a month. It's all very casual - stay for the full hour and a half or just 5 minutes. If picking up litter isn't for you then join us anyway with a blanket and a flask and cheer us on. It's a lovely sociable time too where we can catch up or make new acquaintances and, "It's quite therapeutic", as one of the regulars puts it. We've often had visitors to the beach join in too when they see what we're doing.

After writing to our elected MP, Sheryll Murray, about the sewage that gets released between

Harbour Beach and Finnygook Beach after heavy rainfall I received a reply stating that "...the Government agreed....mandating progressive reductions in discharge and agreeing targets that the water companies must achieve..." I bumped into a South West Water engineer who was taking photos of the sewage release beyond the harbour (while people were swimming there) during a beach clean. He was of the opinion that ..."those high up need to re-direct some of the bonuses paid to themselves and shareholders to invest in bigger capacity to prevent overflows." So, we watch and wait for change.

There is a very useful App - Surfers Against Sewage Safer Seas and Rivers Systems - that allows you to monitor recent sewage release on your local beach.

The beach cleans covered by this newsletter are Saturdays 24th June (12.30-2pm), 15th July (9.30-11am) and 19th August (10-11.30am).

Please bring your own equipment and please take your rubbish home to avoid overfilling the public bins. Please recycle anything you can. This is all done at your own risk.

Sheviock Parish

An update on the SEASONAL PSPO DOG RE-STRICTIONS CORNWALL regarding HOODNY and HARBOUR BEACH. Cornwall Council are in favour of a unified seasonal dog restriction on listed Cornwall Beaches from July to August 10am -6pm. Our Clerk Nancy represented the Parish Council during Public Participation at The Cornwall Council Neighbourhood Scrutiny Committee meeting. Cornwall Cllr Ewert further represented the Parish. The Committee resolved to recommend the reinstatement of the 24/7 ban Easter Sunday to October the 1st - as it had worked previously and been asked for/consulted upon within the parish when first established, the parish can erect signage at the entrances and has its own enforcement officer. The beaches had been omitted entirely from the Order due to an admin error by Cornwall Council. However, despite all the above the Portfolio holder for Cornwall Council has made the final decision over riding the views of the parish.

Therefore, a seasonal ban will be in place from July/August 10 am-6 pm on the Harbour and Hoodny beach.

Finnygook beach will remain dog friendly all year.

I know many of you will share our disappointment and frustration at this further demonstration of Cornwall Council's take on democracy. We have already had reports of visitors and locals alike suffering the results of poorly controlled dogs.

I would like to express thanks to Cornwall Cllr. Kate Ewert for her unstinting support during our efforts. Also to Kerenza Moore, whose Cornish Times articles regarding our plight helped illustrate the inconsistencies in CC's approach.

Parish Spring Clean

On the subject of Beach Cleans around 100 syringes have been recovered from the harbour, Hoodny and we think these have washed ashore. Please be aware and let us know should any more be discovered.

The parish council have been

considering our position on the notification from St Mary's church PCC advice of the closure to burials in the churchyard. Historically when this occurs responsibility passes automatically to the Parish council who then would pass on that responsibility to the county council. However, our concerns are that Cornwall Council have been unable to provide definitive guidance despite having been considering their position for two years. Further, the guidelines state that the property should be in a good state of repair before

relinquishing responsibility but this will patently not be the case with an estimated £240,000 repairs required to a collapsing wall. Again, we appear to be stuck between a rock and a hard place; as a parish council there is absolutely no way we could resource the costs inherited from a large well resourced body; even if we're successful in passing on the responsibility to CC, they could simply increase our council tax contributions to absorb the costs.

Local Public Transport Update

LOCAL BUS SERVICES — As expected there is little change to our local bus services in the current new timetable that commenced on the 2nd April. There is a scheduled timing change to the morning No.75 School bus that could be beneficial to those travelling to Plymouth, as it is now timed to run several minutes earlier to connect with a 70 A Bus that arrives Royal Parade at 09.00, some 30 minutes earlier than previously. However due to much confusion & lack of communication the connection has not as far as I am aware been working. I hope it will be resolved soon but currently the new timings are shown in the new 2nd April T.T; if you can get one, but the old timings are still shown in the Bus Stop T.T. Cases.

Despite several reminders we still have not received any of the large controversial new timetables for our area. We have been incorrectly told that there are not any changes, as the timings of the 70/A/B services were all altered on the 30th October in the large all Cornwall timetable that was issued on the 4th September and now there are also the schoolbus alterations. The timetables are controversial because of their large size & waste of paper, when most users only use one or two pages of the T.T. It does not include all bus services & no longer contains local rail, ferry & air services plus there are no longer any local bus leaflets. I have copied off the 70A/70B Weekday & the 75 Services from the online Cornwall T.T and put a small supply in the Crafthole Post Office, which I can increase but the print is small and may be difficult to read for some.

I am afraid that the unreliability of our local bus services has continued recently to be very concerning. On the 9th May a Cornish Newspaper headlined "Bus disruption across Cornwall due to staff absence and vehicle breakdowns". including reference to No 75 's being cancelled that morning. If a 75 is cancelled on the outward Liskeard – Torpoint journey, it usually means that the return trip from Torpoint is also cancelled, and this seems to be a regular occurrence with several incidents each week plus significant late running. There are problems with the 70A/70B's as well e.g. with 2 successive 70A Buses the 10.00 & 11.00 ex Royal Parade— Cremyll Buses being cancelled on the 4th May. We sympathise with GCB Operators with the problems they are facing with driver shortages & breakdowns, but think it is very sad that opportunities have been & are still being missed by Cornwall Council to make bus travel easier & much less anxious for some of our local bus users.

The Government has just issued what seems to be the best funding news we have heard for some time as it is substantially longer term than usual. The £2 Bus Fare cap has been extended again only to the 31st October, but it will be then kept at £2.50 until November 2024 when its effectiveness will be reviewed. This funding will cost £200 million but Mark Harper the Transport Secretary has also confirmed that there will be an additional £300 million to protect vital routes until 2025.

There have been recent signs that give us a glimmer of hope that we may be able to look a bit more positively at local bus travel in the future, and we have taken appropriate action relating to recent problems we have faced. When we were informed that it was proposed to reduce the hours that the Cornwall Concessionary Passes could be used, we thought it inevitable that it would happen. We also thought the consultation we took part in may only be a paper exercise, but I am happy we were proved wrong as the passes are to remain valid 24/7. Evidently Cornwall Councillor Connor Donnithorne who is the new holder of Portfolio for Transport in the Cornwall Cabinet blocked the reduced hours proposal and has also developed a free Cornwall wide bus pass for care leavers in Cornwall aged 18-25. He has also been connected with some specific bus improvements etc.

LOCAL TRAIN SERVICES. - The only significant change to trains calling at St. Germans in the new timetable that will have been operative since 21st May, shows that persistence can pay, as ever since the St. Germans PTUG was formed in 2006 they have continued to campaign for the early morning Dockyard Train to be reinstated and now it has happened with a train departing the station for Plymouth at 06.59.

THE RPPTUG AGM will be held IN THE MEMORIAL HALL CRAFTHOLE ON THE 19TH JUNE COMMENCING AT 18.00 but what is more important is that it is combined with A FOLLOW UP MEETING to the one held at the same venue last year. The business part of the AGM will not take long and the Chairman's Report will be relevant to the meeting as it will be a summary of all that has and has not happened during the year. We have produced A QUESTIONNAIRE that will be circulated with this Parish Newsletter.

Another bulletin from your Board of Directors - 3 months seems to pass very quickly.


Well, not a lot to report really (I can hear those

sighs of relief). We are looking forward to warmer weather and will, of course, try to keep up with the demand for cold drinks and ices. Talking of which, you will be pleased to hear that our freezer, which has been out of action for several months, has at last been repaired and is now fully stocked. We also look forward to the summer glut from local gardeners, who often donate their surplus of courgettes, tomatoes, squashes etc. and later, apples - they are much appreciated. We had a good response to our questionnaire in the previous issue - a lot of positive support and suggestions. We shall be discussing this at our next Directors' meeting and hope to be able to implement some of your ideas. Meanwhile, sadly, the PO is all set to close at the end of June and thus will begin a new era for the shop. We will, of course, have many challenges to face and we would ask you to be patient with us as we feel our way towards the future. We appreciate, too. the disruption that losing our PO will cause our customers. Many of you will be unable to access banking facilities, in particular. We shall endeavour to keep a good supply of stamps, BUT we have had VERY DISAPPOINTING news from "Post Office Ltd" who have said, quite categorically, that they WILL NOT provide us with a mobile unit. The Board of Directors are extremely disappointed by this decision and feel that no effort has been made by them to look at our topographical position and to consider the needs of a rural community which a) does not have a reliable bus service and b) has a high number of young families and elderly residents, for whom collecting their family allowance/pensions etc will now be very difficult, not to mention the local small businesses and community organisations who



have to deposit cash at various times. We shall be contacting our Local Councillor and MP and also writing to Post Office ltd. to register our disgust at this decision. We would urge EVERYONE who feels the same as we do to also make contact - people power can be very persuasive. This is not just a shop and PO, it is your Community hub, a socialising centre, a place where people - especially those who are alone - can get together and keep contact with the outside world. I am including emails and /or addresses below ... PLEASE DO WRITE. We hope that you all have a lovely summer - I know we need the rain, but only at night ... and we also hope that you will all make that extra effort to support your Community Shop as much as you can. One thing I can tell you from nearly all the responses we had, was that you feel our shop is not only appreciated for its stock, it is cherished for so much more. Long may this continue. Language

Writing in the previous newsletter, I mentioned I was heading off to Liverpool to enjoy the Eurovision Song Contest. Alas, we didn't get tickets, but we did soak up the atmosphere around the city, and to hear all sorts of languages being spoken, alongside that special form of English known as 'Scouse'!

Languages are so important to us because they help make us who we are. Language variations mark out one group of people from another; ask a Brummie what 'D'reckly' means, and they may not have a clue. One generation can be distinguished from another by language too. Who hasn't had the experience of wondering what a younger (or an older!) person was talking about because we didn't recognise the words being used?

As a teenager, I remember hearing on the radio the song Down Under by the band Men at Work. It features the line, "Hey there, do you speak my language? He just smiled and gave me a Vegemite sandwich." I didn't know what Vegemite was until many years later when I went 'down under' to work in Papua New Guinea (PNG). I travelled to volunteer with an organisation running literacy programmes and translating the Bible into local languages. PNG is a place ripe for such work as there are over 850 languages spoken there. I saw first-hand how powerful it is when someone can read for the first time, and especially when they receive a Bible to read in their native tongue.

Personally, I've never been great shakes at learning languages; at school I struggled with French, and later at theological



college training to be a church minister I did only adequately with koine Greek (an original language of the Bible). Still, I am reassured that what we say can be much more important than the language we use so long as the meaning comes across. A very popular piece of the Bible, often read at weddings, begins, "If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal." In other words, however fluent we might be, however sweet sounding our words, if we don't speak with an attitude of love and care it just becomes noise. That's a challenge to me, and to you. We have plenty enough angry and destructive language being bandied about around us; how about we try to fill the air with more useful speech?

As a Bible prayer puts it, "May the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart

Be acceptable in Your sight, O Lord, my strength and my Redeemer." (Psalm 19:14)
