Latest Scams To Be Aware Of

Police pretenders

Scammers call, text or email you, out of the blue, and claim to be police officers. They lie that they're involved in an undercover investigation and they need your help.

They may claim your local bank branch is giving out fake or counterfeit banknotes. You can help them put a stop to this by withdrawing some cash at the branch and handing it over to an 'undercover officer' for fingerprint analysis.

They arrange for an 'undercover officer' or courier to pick up the cash, and you're told you'll be reimbursed after the investigation. You hand over the money, but you never hear from them again.

They may also say they suspect a local shop is selling fake copies of goods, like watches or laptops. So, you need to go buy these expensive items and give them to the 'undercover officer' or courier for investigation. You hand over the goods, and you're never reimbursed.

Or they may say your money is at risk and you need to transfer it to a safe account. The police will never ask you to do this.

The criminals will tell you not to tell anyone about this. It's an ongoing police investigation, and you'll compromise it by talking to someone. They keep you trapped in their lie and move on to scam another innocent person.

 It can be scary to receive one of these calls or messages. You want to help, and you wouldn't normally question the police.

But there are some questions you can ask yourself to check what you're being told.

How do I know they are who they say they are? If they're really a police officer, they can show you their ID and tell you which force they're with. You can then call that police force (opens in a new window) on 101 to confirm who they are.

Is this a real investigation?

It's very unlikely that the police would need to call you in person to help with an investigation. And if it's a real investigation, it will have a crime number. Ask them for this number and call 101 to check it matches anything they have.

Why am I being asked to withdraw or spend my own money?

The police can buy goods from stores and take out money in bank branches themselves. If you're being asked to use your own money, this is a sign of a scam.

Have I ever been asked to do something like this before?

Neither the police nor any other legitimate organisation would ever ask you for your card or PIN or to take out money or buy items on their behalf. If you're asked to do something with your own money, especially out of the blue, or if it feels at all odd – hang up the 'phone. Call the number on the back of your bank card to check it with us or dial 101 to go directly to the police.

Why am I being told not to tell anyone about this? There's no reason you cannot talk it through with those you trust. They may spot something suspicious or know something you don't.

Sheviock Parish

Lots to look at in the coming months.
Following years of work with Cornwall council and Cormac, we have a proposal for long requested improvements to aid the traffic flow through the parish. This is separate from the 20mph speed limit proposal, which I'll cover elsewhere.
Proposed works:

- Revised road signage at Polscoe A374 junction and at the top of Antony Hill directing traffic away from Crafthole thus reducing through traffic
- Improved road markings on Polscoe junction

- Yellow lines on the road between mini roundabout and the Finnygook Inn reducing constriction.
- Additional parking spaces up to the crossroads junction with Finnygook Lane.
- New build parking spaces above Burns View 1-7.
- Removal of cushions at the East end of Crafthole.
- Resurfacing red pedestrian virtual pavements.
- Various other improvements and vegetation clearance.

Look out for the posting for this work and I hope you'll find it beneficial to the community.

Dogs

Following parishioners questioning the efficacy of the Dog Warden's role, we've decided to post the monthly report. Reading these reports will hopefully illustrate the on going issues we have in trying to educate people in responsible control of their dogs. There was a prosecution for failing to pick up dog poo, and whilst in this case it was not due to the parish council's action, we will continue to pursue offenders. But we can only take action when provided with evidence so, if you witness someone not clearing up please let us know.

20 mph

You will see the proposals posted around the parish indicating the 20 mph zones. These are very much common sense plans with existing 20 mph zones tidied up and only sited at built up areas. Please take the opportunity to make any comments on the portal.



This trailer appears to have been abandoned on the road between the mini roundabout and the Finnygook. We will report it to Cornwall Council and have it removed if it hasn't been claimed and moved by June 14th.

Council News

2024 Sheviock Parish Council Chair's Report.

Your parish council continues to strive to work for the benefit of you, the parishioners.

Nancy our Clerk has been busy setting up the "Just Park" scheme to enable car parkers to use their mobile phones to pay. This should reduce the amount of cash collected which is a time consuming task during the summer period. We are constantly looking at problems with the roads. The bend at Polscoe has had the visibility improved following hedge work by the tenant. We also are constantly asking for Highways to ensure the road works diversionary signage is made more relevant. The locality frequently becomes gridlocked due to signs which simply state "Road Closed Ahead" with no consideration of which routes lie ahead and are unaffected leading to needless detours by local traffic.

The defibrillators require constant attention with repairs, faults and upkeep. We are grateful for the support of The Finnygook for supporting their defib.

The Church's bid to pass on the responsibility and repair costs onto Cornwall council by way of the parish council is ongoing. We continue to approach this in a manner respecting the best interests of our parishioners. We are very appreciative of the support being given by Cornwall Council and our Cornwall councillor Kate Ewert.

The Portrinkle toilets continue to be maintained to an extremely high standard thanks to Francis and our contractor. We do still seek someone to fill our cleaner's vacancy. The toilets suffer from excessive mould due to lack of ventilation so we are looking to replace the windows with opening casements.

We continue to devote much time to planning issues.

This year's excessive rainfall has led to multiple land slips along our coastline, including Portwrinkle and Blackieball. This has led to some cases of footpath closures. Other footpaths face maintenance issues at Ladywell and Georges Lane. We have again due to fiscal diligence kept the precept at a reasonable level.

I acknowledge the sterling efforts of our councillors and Nancy, and look forward to another year of service.

The parish council has been waiting for a meeting regarding the notification from St Mary's church PCC of the closure to burials in the churchyard. Historically when this occurs responsibility passes automatically to the Parish council who then would pass on that responsibility to the County Council. The meeting planned for February , postponed to March 20th has again been delayed while the church considers it's stance on proposals from Cornwall council.

Doreen Evans 14/10/39 - 4/4/24

Doreen was born on the 14th October, 1939 in Romford, Essex. The family moved to the Camberwell/Peckham area of London when Doreen was guite young. Doreen was very family orientated always looking out for her brothers and even though she had the qualifications to go to university, which her parents encouraged her to do, she was adamant that she wanted to train to be a secretary. This meant she could remain at home. Doreen was a highly qualified secretary and worked between Whitehall and Westminster helping prepare speeches and questions whilst Parliament was in session. At times this meant working long unpredictable hours. She was the secretary who accompanied Edward Heath to Brussels during negotiations to join the European Union. Doreen never spoke about her work because to her "that was her job". She was a very open, caring person but private at the same time.

It was at this time that she met Frank. When Doreen and Frank married on 11th March 1961, they lived in Southfields, London.

Frank and Doreen had two sons, Michael and an adopted son James, and Doreen's life became orientated around her own family, especially as James suffered from bouts of ill health. For a while Frank's work necessitated moving house more than once, but finally the family settled in Wiltshire. In 2014 Doreen, Frank, Michael and his wife and daughter moved to the Glebe Barn in Sheviock and became part of the Parish community. James preferring to remain in Wiltshire. Doreen pursued her love of gardening by planting and caring for the tubs and hanging baskets surrounding the Barns

creating a colourful welcome to visitors staying in the holiday cottages attached to the Glebe Barn. Sadly James died on 13th July 2017.

Doreen adored her granddaughter, Amy, and was so pleased when she decided to train as a teacher. Doreen also helped with the Food Bank at St James in Torpoint, and assisted in the kitchen to prepare and serve "community" lunches always looking for ways in which she could help and care for people. Doreen died suddenly and unexpectedly on the 4th April, 2024. She will be missed by many in the immediate and surrounding community. After moving to Sheviock, Doreen quickly became part of our church family.

The church meant a great deal to her and not only did she attend faithfully each week but she also came in frequently during the week to spend time alone in the peace of the building.

Doreen also helped to clean the church applying wax and polishing the pew ends with a toothbrush after the Heritage project works and taking part in our regular Church Care mornings. She took her turn at the daily task of opening and closing the church. She served as a sacristan, a welcomer and a coffee volunteer. She willingly distributed letters and fliers around the village and supported our book club. Doreen contributed generously to church appeals, particularly any which involved children. She had the gift of being able to welcome newcomers, taking an interest in everyone and giving time and attention to all. She found the time to visit and support members of the congregation who were unwell or lonely.

We shall miss Doreen so much for her loyalty, support and her quiet sense of humour.

Located on the hilltop, Trewickle Farm, West of Crafthole.


From Crafthole take the Downderry road B3247, continue along this road a further two fields past Trewickle lane, then the gate is on the RHS

Due to the difficulty in accessing this location: uneven ground, lack of footways, no street lighting, No parking/no vehicular access; those that attend are advised to:

Local Public Transport Update

OUR LOCAL BUS SERVICE It has recently been confirmed that the joint bid by Plymouth City Council, Plymouth City Bus & Cornwall Council has been successful in obtaining government funding for fifty Zero-emission electric double deck buses that include an allocation of six buses to run on the 70/70A/70B Routes. This will mean that electric buses will operate on most weekdays on three 70B buses that call at Crafthole & Sheviock en route to Royal Parade and on five 70B buses departing Royal Parade that call at our villages. The Project Partners have thanked us for our letter of support that accompanied, the bid, but we of course very much welcome being consulted about such projects that can only be of benefit to our local community. MORE INFORMATION ABOUT THE OPERATION OF THE NEW ELECTRIC BUSES IN OUR RPPTUG AREA WILL BE GIVEN BY GO S.W. BUS AT OUR AGM/ PUBLIC MEETING TO BE HELD IN THE SCOUT HALL, FORE STREET, MILLBROOK ON MONDAY 17TH JUNE FROM 6.30PM. We hope that all our prospective parliamentary candidates will attend this meeting. It is just a pity that we will not also have new electric buses operating on our local Cinderella Bus Service – The No.75!

We are delighted that common sense has at last prevailed thanks to Go South West Bus, for responding to our pleas for a bus timetable covering our local bus services, that is easy to use and that local bus users can take with them on their travels. The excellent new Tamar Connections Timetables that they have produced are ideal, as they not only includes our 70/70A/70B & No.75 bus routes but also the CityBus No 34 Royal Parade – George Park & Ride Bus that links both the Cremyll & Torpoint Ferries with Derriford Hospital. The 34 is being used by an increasing number of local residents as the best way to get to the Hospital for patients, workers & visitors alike. Some residents park their cars at Torpoint & Cremyll, travel by foot on the ferry & then catch the No. 34 Bus to the hospital. The new Tamar Connections T.T.'s are now available in the Crafthole Community Shop, the Memorial Hall, and the Crafthole Telephone Kiosk etc. There is now little need or demand for the large bulky all Cornwall Bus Timetable that has been strongly criticised by many for a number of reasons.

We continue to press for improvements to our local bus services using existing resources and in particular the re routing of the 15.00 No.70 ex Plymouth – Cremyll Bus on Schooldays, when there is not a connection to the No.75 at Torpoint that there should be. It is good that seven minutes have been added to all the timings of the 75 Liskeard to Torpoint Buses thus reducing the late running, but there are still a number of anomalies in the timings. The 07.25 ex Liskeard 75 Bus continues to regularly run approx. ten minutes late, and the timetable now shows impossible connecting times, with the scheduled departure times for the No.70 at Torpoint being shown as before the No.75 arrives. It also takes a few minutes at Torpoint to walk from where the No.75 terminates (often across traffic queues) and where the No.70 departs for Plymouth, or alternatively on to the ferry itself. The fact cannot be disguised that there is not a morning commuter bus service that would enable residents living in Seaton, Downderry & Portwrinkle etc. to arrive in Plymouth before 09.00 e.g. for those attending schools in Plymouth.

There is an interesting recent article sent to me, that you can easily find on the internet, entitled 'A Premature ride on the Mid Cornwall Metro' written by Roger French OBE a retired & much respected ex managing director of large bus companies. As you will probably know the Government awarded no less than a £50 million levelling up grant to fund the controversial so called metro from Newquay to Falmouth, using existing rail lines with an estimated total cost of £56.8 million. After travelling over the route of the proposed hourly through service using existing connecting train services, Mr French has raised the same concerns as I and others have also done of 'Who is going to use the new metro service?'. when such good and cheaper bus services already exist in the area that directly link the town centres and the university campuses etc: Mr French points out that the most worrying concern is that if the project does not live up to its expectations, it will be Cornwall Council picking up the financial price tag with the possibility of money being taken from the Councils Public Transport Subsidy Budget that could further detrimentally affect the County's Bus Services. It seem likely that further debate on this highly expensive project & how its was researched, will continue for some time at both a national & local level.

The Race Rev Jonathan Budd

There was only one race that I regularly took notice of as a kid. It wasn't the gruelling steeplechase in the Commonwealth Games or the manic peloton in the Tour De France; no, it was *Wacky Races*, a cartoon in which a mix of oddballs tried to drive first across the finish line. Penelope Pitstop, Professor Pat Pending, and others whose names did not begin with P (e.g. The Ant Hill Mob) all had their attractions, but for me the most compelling one was in car double-zero. Dick Dastardly was the villain who would do anything to win.

Soon the Olympic Games will be back. Likely, some competing will fail drugs tests, or be accused of cheating. The pressures on athletes are great, as are the potential rewards. Yet to pursue winning at all costs, whatever the impact on oneself or others, is to lose in life. It betrays a skewed attitude to what is of value.

Jesus told a parable about a successful farmer who loses grip on what matters in life. "A man's life does not consist in the abundance of his possessions", says Jesus, meaning all sorts of things which a person might gain, objects, money, titles, privileges, trophies and medals and more. It is not so much the things gained that are wrong, but the means and attitude towards getting them, and being obsessed by them. As Jesus asks, "What good is it for a person to gain the world and lose their soul?"

Sprinter Harold Abrahams in the biopic *Chariots of Fire* spells out his personal dilemma:

"I will raise my eyes and look down that corridor; 4 feet wide, with 10 lonely seconds to justify my whole existence. But WILL I?".

The problem is that ultimately, none of us can 'justify our existence'. We don't get to pronounce such judgments. Only God can see well

enough, and whether we keep God in sight is more important than the rate we drag to the finish line.

Eric Liddle, Abraham's teammate famously had a different mindset. His life ended in service as a missionary in China, and he is revered to this day there. Driven to compete, he always did so keeping things in perspective. In the film he speaks to an admiring crowd like this:

"You came to see a race today. To see someone win. It happened to be me. But I want you to do more than just watch a race. I want you to take part in it. I want to compare faith to running in a race. It's hard. It requires concentration of will, energy of soul. You experience elation when the winner breaks the tape especially if you've got a bet on it. But how long does that last? You go home. Maybe your dinner's burnt. Maybe you haven't got a job. So who am I to say, "Believe, have faith," in the face of life's realities? I would like to give you something more permanent, but I can only point the way. I have no formula for winning the race. Everyone runs in her own way, or his own way. And where does the power come from, to see the race to its end? From within. Jesus said, 'Behold, the Kingdom of God is within you. If with all your hearts, you truly seek me, you shall ever surely find me.' If you commit yourself to the love of Christ, then that is how you run a straight race."
